

Minutes of Annual Meeting 2023

January 29, 2023

The Rev. Marshall Shelly, Rector, opened the meeting with a prayer and convened the Annual Meeting of 2023 at 10:40 AM following the morning church service. Father Marshall made a motion for Alison Hyland to be appointed Recording Secretary for the 2023 Annual Meeting. Motion was accepted by all in attendance.

The minutes of the 2022 January Annual Meeting were presented and unanimously accepted by all in attendance. Father acknowledged outgoing Warden, Maureen Barlow, who was completing her term as well as the continuing Warden, Beverly Stott. Father Marshall thanked Maureen for her service and outlined some of her accomplishments. Maureen was given a gift certificate.

A motion to accept election results was moved by Bill Drake and seconded by Kathie Evans with unanimous approval.

The reports began with the Financial and Stewardship by Bev Stott. The budget was not on hand due to printer issues and will be posted by pdf for viewing. Bev thanked the Finance Committee for their work. Alison was thanked for her work on Stewardship. Bev reported that we had a great year well above expectations of \$140,000 congregation giving. The Thrift Shop brought in \$123,000 over 11 months. Income received for 2022 saw a catchup of \$8800. Misc. income of \$13,000 was more than budgeted for 2022. Expenses included the calling of a part-time Associate Rector, the Rev. Elizabeth Marshall Casasola. The position of organist was reinstated. In looking forward, the Capital Budget is expected to include a number of projects, including a new church roof and siding, driveway repairs, and AC reinstallations and repairs for the Parish Hall.

Stewardship Campaign – 47 total pledges of \$89,000 out of 55 proposed pledges. Stewardship will continue all year round instead of once a year. Stewardship projects will include a church brochure in English and Spanish, birthday, thinking of you and anniversary cards and Stewardship events. Giving Statements will be online, upon request and available in hard copy. Father thanked Bev. Stott for her hard work.

Outgoing Warden, Maureen Barlow, offered the Warden's Address:

There was a ribbon cutting for the Community Room, Craig Kafafian was thanked as well as past Wardens for their service. The thrift shop was renamed The Shop at St. Peter's. Thrift shop volunteers, parishioners and non-parishioners, were thanked for their hard work. Maureen reported that St. Peter's returned to normalcy after the pandemic with Chalice Bearers and Women's and Men's Breakfast and

Wednesday suppers serving hundreds of people. Maureen further reported that Rev. Liz's ordination is planned for February 11, 2023. Coffee hour will return, and the thrift shop will be open one Sunday every month. Maureen stepped down as Warden and wished Beverly Stott and John Grennen good luck.

Father Marshall offered the Rector's Address:

The pandemic has reached "endemic status" resulting in some losses for the parish. We have also received and welcomed new members with our reopening in person worship and service. St. Peter's is experiencing growth with online bible study, in addition to Confirmations and Baptisms. St. Peters is seeing an increase in new parishioners, with a welcome extended by inception of bilingual worship. There has been progress with the thrift shop operating at its full potential. Father thanked Christine Sickels, Administrator, and Wardens Maureen Barlow and Beverly Stott. Father announced St. Peter's new Minster of Music, Jessica Paiva. Special thanks was given to Father's wife, Laura, for her support. Father announced upcoming celebrations in the life of Christ with a Lenten Series. Two co-Treasurers will be voted in at the next Vestry meeting. The meeting attendees sang "Jesus Remember Me When You Go to Your Kingdom" as Father remembered those who passed away in 2022, those who were baptized, Confirmed, Received and weddings.

Father Marshall asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting, the motion for adjournment was made and seconded concluding with a unanimous vote. Father Marshall closed the meeting with a prayer at 11:30 AM.

RECTOR'S ADDRESS

As noted below by our departing warden, Bev, this has been a year "rooted in abundance." So much has happened at St. Peter's, in our common life and shared call to ministry in Christ that I stand humbled and tongue-tied before you, composing an annual address that finds me humbled and awed by the work that God is doing through us all. St. Peter's has been a haven of comfort and care for me and for my family in the midst of a year of impossible loss. Even as Laura and I traveled to Pittsburgh and Columbus to attend to family in crisis, you were there to assure us that all would be cared for at home. With my mother and sister passing away, your prayers and support have meant the world to us. On behalf of my family and our journey, we are so very thankful for the support of the wardens, Vestry, and you. Thank you and bless you. For over a decade, I have been honored to care for you as your priest. For the past year, you have cared for your priest and his family. We thank and bless God for you.

A special note of thanks is due our wardens. Bev Stott and John Grennen have lent their wisdom, skill and grace to a leadership of lay vocation that has been exemplary during my tenure as the 36th rector of St. Peter's. Bev completes her term having accomplished as a leader in our parish some of the most challenging transitions one can imagine. She has led us through the financial transitions of both a change in treasurers and a transformation of our stewardship ministries. She has restored our counter ministry and overseen the streamlining of our contributions and record-keeping. Her steady hand and passion for the health and well-being of St. Peter's have been a gift to us all. John and I have been blessed to walk with her as a colleague in leadership. Please join me in thanking Bev for her many contributions to the life of St. Peter's, and for her continuing leadership in the Stewardship, Shop and Fellowship ministries of the parish.

John's returning wisdom has also been a blessing to us. In the midst of particular challenges in regard to our buildings and grounds, he and Bill Drake have continually gone above and beyond the call to lay the groundwork for our coming efforts to restore our capital resources to full health. Caring for historical properties requires much from all involved, and John's experience and deep institutional knowledge are a continued blessing for our parish.

We also rejoice in our diocesan life, as we welcome and celebrate the consecration and installation of the first diocesan Bishop of New Jersey who is a woman. Bishop Sally is also, we believe, the first diocesan Bishop in the Anglican Communion to have been ordained Deacon, Priest and Bishop by female leadership in the Church. May God bless our Bishop and her family, as we of the Diocese of New Jersey welcome her home!

My thanks must also extend to our incredible and remarkable staff. Our parish administrator, Chris, marks her 5th year with us, and her support and care for the needs of this parish has seen us through times light and dark, we are blessed! Our clergy staff has been growing, with the addition of our Associate Rector, Reverend Liz' growth as a priest of the Church feeding us with her passion and love for the ministry and her vocation as a counselor and licensed social worker. She stands tall here and in the diocese as a leader in the bi-vocational ministry of many priests, whose gifts bridge the open places between the Church and the world around us. She has brought us the gift of both Blue Christmas and Supper Church, and her creativity and enthusiasm for St. Peter's lifts us all up. Her renewal of our grief-counseling ministry and her support with our formation and fellowship ministries build us up in our call to form and make disciples of Jesus.

Our minister of music, Jessica, has reminded us of the joy we take in singing God's praises. A return of song and a renewal of our choir ministries have been a joyous witness of her talent, faith and grace in leading us in worship and song. As she departs for a time on maternity leave, we also look forward to her return to us sometime before Holy Week. We are blessed to have her with us, and to welcome her home to St. Peter's! We also must lift us and give thanks to God for our seminarian, Eva Dalzell. Eva came to us from the Diocese of Massachusetts (via connection with Rev. Liz), and Princeton Theological Seminary. Her walking alongside us as seminarian has meant us all being gifted with new, fresh eyes for the ministries of preaching, formation and service. Eva will be working with us through the end of the academic year, and then she will be pursuing Clinical Pastoral Education training and looking forward to her candidacy interviews next year. Our hope is that she will continue to find St. Peter's a fertile garden of ministry that will help her in her discernment toward ordination and service in the Church.

Our ministries have weathered immense change through the course of the last three years. We have met the challenges of being a faith community in the face of a pandemic and have also met the struggle of the changes in our world and society as humanity struggles with war, economic distress and upset amid profound transformations in our culture and society. St. Peter's, even as we contend with the vicissitudes of climate change, hunger in our local community and insecurity in our social systems, we strive to be a welcoming community, celebrating the love of Christ that draws us all together. We might not know the future, but we know who we are in Christ, and that faith gives us hope as we endure together the wondrous and dynamic tumult that is our human journey in this life we share.

We would not have been able to work through all the challenges of the past years without our prayerful and considerate leadership that rests with our Vestry and the Community of Hope Board. On the parish side, the Vestry has served as a council of advice to the Rector and Wardens. They have rooted our common work with a vision of faith that has supported growth in our ministries, the inception of new ways to serve God in Christ and to keep us going in the midst of great change. Jennifer Alexander and the CoHM Board have kept, and grown, our feeding ministries. The Suppers and Kellie's Cupboard feed the hungry on Wednesday evenings. Alice's CUP feeds our community Tuesdays through Thursdays and our Parish Garden under the leadership of Ralph Evans grows tons of fresh vegetables for all. As well, a new ministry created by our youth CoHM volunteers, the Lunch Bunch, meets monthly to pack bag lunches for our feeding ministries.

This is a season of hope and growth for St. Peter's. I do not offer that simply as aspiration, even though my dreams for us are great. It is a prayer of thanksgiving for our ministries and our community. We are a church that welcomes all home to a richer life in Christ, and that grace is found in our fellowship ministries, our formation groups (Sunday School, First Wednesdays, the Breakfasts, etc). We have found it as well with the inception and embrace of bilingual worship. In that stead, this my annual report is offered both in Spanish and English. We continue to grow, and to welcome all.

This year, I was also able to begin study for a Doctor of Ministry, with the support of the wardens, vestry and my family. Without you, this next step in my training and education would have been impossible. Thank you for the opportunity to continue to grow and evolve as a priest of the Church. I close with a benediction on behalf of my spouse, Laura and me for the honor and privilege of being in your midst. Without Laura, my ministry would not be possible. Without all of you, we would not have as wondrous a spiritual home as this, our beloved St. Peter's.

The SHOP has not only had a record year financially but has also provided many people in the community with resources, beyond the goods that can be purchased. For example, we have been able to provide warm coats, hats and gloves to organizations in need. The volunteers should be celebrated for their hard work and commitment

Many of our post-covid ministries have returned. The Men's and Women's Breakfast continue to provide fellowship and friendship. The Youth Group, Church School, and return of the passing of the offertory plate have been re-energized.

Most importantly, we truly are *Rooted in Abundance* by all who attend, volunteer and participate in the life of St. Peter's. Today as I step back as the Warden, I would like to thank everyone for supporting the vestry and the parish. I can't wait to see what 2024 brings to St. Peter's.

ASSOCIATE RECTOR'S REPORT

Dear St. Peter's Community,

I write this with immense gratitude for the multitude of blessings that St. Peter's has shared in my first full year of ordained life. Last year started with immense joy & a deeply felt sense of the Holy Spirit as Bishop Chip ordained me a Priest with you all consenting. Thank you for hosting such a sacred day & celebration. My extended family & friends who traveled & zoomed in from around the country (& world) have continued to note how strongly they felt St. Peters' hospitality in the service & incredible reception afterwards.

I want to give particular thanks for the mentorship of Fr. Marshall as I have learned & become more comfortable in celebrating the Eucharist, leading liturgy, preaching, & engaging in the multiple facets of congregational life. I have felt empowered both by you & by Fr. Marshall to listen deeply to ways God is calling & stretching us together into new ministries & opportunities.

One of those ministries that I'm grateful you said *yes* to was engaging in a dinner church service for Maundy Thursday, where our meal was the service very much like the life of the early church. One of the many reasons I appreciate this model of worship is that it creates space for deeper connection with one another.

Another of those ministries that you said *yes* to are our quarterly Saturday formation retreats. We began in June with a half-day on "*How do I Pray?*" engaging in reflection & different forms of prayer. In October, we gathered again for a retreat on bread baking as a spiritual practice, preparing & reflecting on the ways our faith connects to table bread, communion bread, & pizza. In December, we gathered for an Advent Quiet Day of prayer, reflection & contemplation.

I'm also grateful that you all have allowed & encouraged me to incorporate my gifts as a bi-vocational Priest & Social Worker. As a trauma focused therapist, it's been deeply meaningful to open up the space of the monthly grief group and Blue Christmas as ministries to hold the weight of trauma & grief in the context of the St. Peter's & larger communities. My initial call to ministry was a call to work at the intersections of trauma & the church & it's been so rich to be able to live into this call here at St. Peter's.

Looking ahead to the next few months, I'm particularly excited to be working with Eva, Fr. Marshall, & 5 lay members of St. Peter's as they step into the pulpit this Lent. In Lent we also look forward to another Saturday formation gathering surrounding Henry Nouwen's book *Return of the Prodigal*. I have heard that there has also been energy surrounding getting outdoors, so we're considering a hiking retreat in June. As we grow these new ministries, please don't hesitate to be in touch if you have any ideas or energy around deepening our formation as St. Peter's.

COHM ANNUAL REPORT

For Community of Hope Ministries (officially St. Peter's Community Development Corporation, a 501(c)3 charitable organization) 2023 was a challenging year. Entering our 4th year of navigating the difficulties stemming from the Covid-19 pandemic, in addition to the rising cost of goods and the increasing needs of our community, COHM, Alice's CUP Food Pantry, and the Wednesday Night Community Supper spent the year attempting to find new ways to feed our neighbors, while maintaining safe and healthy environments for our clients and volunteers.

In 2023, Alice's CUP Food Pantry served an average of 254 households per month. This is an increase of over 50 households per month over 2022. It should be noted that during the last quarter of 2023 alone, CUP saw an increase of approximately 30 families per month. We continue to serve our community using our Client's Choice model. Thanks to Andrea LoSacco, our Volunteer Coordinator, the pantry has remained well staffed each week. COHM continues to be blessed by a wonderfully generous community, having been approached by many businesses, local schools, Scout Troops, and individual families, all interested in hosting food drives to benefit Alice's CUP. We have been so blessed that many weeks we have been able to share our abundance of donations with surrounding pantries who needed extra supplies. The pantry continues to be well stocked thanks to pantry MVPs Rich Doran & Joe Kelly, who spend countless hours accepting donations, making runs to pick up from REPLENISH and ShopRite, and ensuring the shelves are always ready for clients.

The Wednesday Night Community Suppers have continued with their take-out services. The suppers continue to serve upwards of 120 meals each week in their "drive-thru" setup. In October, Kellie's Cupboard, an extension of Alice's CUP on supper evening, hosted its official ribbon cutting. This event was attended by Kellie Baker's daughter, Samantha, and her closest friend, Nancy. As always, we are so grateful for Jeannie Fitzpatrick, our dedicated kitchen staff, and the many runners who work so tirelessly to keep the Wednesday Night Suppers running successfully during a time when they are so greatly needed.

This year also saw the birth of the Lunch Bunch. Created by our youngest board members, Chris Alexander and Casey Stephens Seickel, this group has made it their mission to find other ways to feed our community. Each month, teens ages 12-17 gather to make bagged lunches that are distributed in the pantry.

The ever-changing world we live in keeps us on our toes, but COHM continues to grow and improve. The most immediate goal for this year is to continue to increase Pantry and Supper visibility in our community, not with the goal of increasing donations, but in the hopes of reaching families and individuals who may be in need of assistance. 2024 goals include but are not limited to: unveiling the new and improved COHM/CUP website, working to increase community education about our CDC by developing an online donation system through the new COHM website and Facebook pages, working towards even better relationships with local groups and businesses, and discovering ways to increase volunteer opportunities in our community for students and teens.

BUILDINGS & GROUNDS REPORT

The building and grounds committee spent considerable time and financial resources keeping up with the aging state of the campus in 2023. We were able to repair small areas of the parking lot, restripe the parking stalls and twice repair a damaged light fixture. The vestry was unexpectedly obliged to replace the air conditioning systems in both church and the Parish Hall, which placed a financial damper on our other lofty goals for 2023. We continue to check blockages in our sanitary sewer system blamed on the old pipes and low flow fixtures and have set up a regular maintenance schedule to prevent backups into the basement of the Parish Hall. During 2023 we continued to investigate long term solutions for the roof leaks in the church, with the understanding that a capital campaign will be needed to address this issue as well as several other pressing issues with our historic, but aging, campus buildings. We continue to make repairs and upgrades to life safety systems, including the fire alarm system, EXIT signs and emergency lighting as required by the Town Fire Inspector.

Our focus for 2024 will be on continued safety improvements, specifically redirecting the roof drain/sump pump discharge, from the parking lot directly to the grassy area below the parking lot, which will necessitate additional parking lot repairs. The committee will also undertake replacing the south stairs of the Parish Hall, which have reached an untenable state of deterioration, while also stabilizing the roof leaks in the church. We will continue to address other repairs as necessary when they arise and work with the Vestry on a capital campaign to provide funding for these and other long-term repairs.

Our music minister, Jessica, taught the students several fun and joyful songs over the course of the year so that they could contribute to our church services with their singing and musical abilities.
